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The project "EU4Business: From Policies to Action" is a multi-country project implemented by the OECD in the Eastern Partnership with financial support from the European Union within the framework of the EU4Business initiative. It is co-ordinated with the work programme of the Eastern Partnership Business Development Panel under Platform 2 on "Economic integration and convergence with EU policies".

The project component on "Monitoring the implementation of Business Development Services policy roadmap" and "Capacity building on support programmes for high-growth enterprises" are implemented by the OECD in close co-operation with the EU to co-ordinate activities. The results of this project will be submitted for peer review at the next session of the OECD Eurasia Competitiveness Roundtable.

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WHAT IS THE PROJECT CONTEXT?

Belarus is in the process of upgrading its policies to create a favorable environment for entrepreneurship and the institutional framework to support small and medium-sized enterprises. In this context, the Government has recently adopted the national SME Promotion Strategy for the period until 2030, with the objective to encourage the growth of the SME sector, increase its competitiveness, create new jobs and raise living standards

In 2016, the OECD supported the Ministry of Economy of Belarus with a policy roadmap to strengthen SME capabilities through Business Development Services (BDS), which was peer reviewed at the OECD Eurasia Competitiveness Roundtable. Policy recommendations focused on three areas: building the institutional framework for delivery of BDS, unlocking latent demand and promoting market-oriented supply of BDS.

■ WHAT IS THE PROJECT OBJECTIVE?

The objective of the project is twofold: i) to monitor progress in the implementation of a policy roadmap to strengthen SME capabilities through improved Business Development Services for SMEs, and ii) to build capacity in Belarus' institutional to design support programmes for high-growth enterprises.

In order to meet this objective, the project will focus on the following activities:

- Strengthen public-private dialogue through Working Group meetings with international experts, Belarusian stakeholders and OECD;
- Provide support in monitoring the implementation of a policy roadmap to improve BDS for SMEs;
- Organise capacity building sessions with international experts to design support programmes for SMEs.

The main beneficiaries of this project are the Ministry of Economy, the Belarusian Fund for Financial Support for Entrepreneurs, the Development Bank of Belarus, and other SME stakeholders involved in the implementation and monitoring of the policy roadmap.



This project is implemented with the financial support of the European Union within the <u>EU4Business</u> initiative. EU4Business is an EU initiative that helps SMEs in the six countries of the Eastern Partnership region to realise their full potential and boost economic growth.
